Whether the current Allied military success in blocking the Communist big-unit offensive into Saigon has squelched or temporarily delayed the planned congress "people's congress" is unknown here at this time.

President Thieu's scheduled Cabinet change, still shrowed in second as no surprise to Saigon; the surprise was that it cam so late. Saigon has been dancing with rumors of a Cabinet shake-up since the Tet offensive, when President Thieu actually considered a reshuffle, but was blocked by of conflicting power groups within the government.

Even recently, haver, sources close to President Thieu said they did not know if the change involved only a Cabinet shake-up, or also a change in the Prime Ministr, or a shift in the character of the Cabinet from one of technocrats to one of politicians.

"Vietnam has a DoCaulle-styled Presidential system of government in which the prime minister and the cabinet act as sort of a si safety valve," one informed source explained. "The minute of the contract of t thornar"When the pressure becomes too great underneath, the President can let the steam escape without an explosion by changing the Cabinet or the Prime Minister. The continuity and legality of the government is maintained by the President offices of the President and the Vice President, and they can put the blame on the administrative administration administration administrators, implementers and technocrats in the Cabinet when things go wrong."

Some diplomatic sources speculated three there might be an outside chance miximum shaking an accordance and the selection of some key left-wing political personalities for a few key posts might reflect a slight modulation of current official policy against the formation of a coalition government with the Communist National Liberation Front.

"The Americans thought they could win the political war by making the government more democratic," one Western diplomat explained.

Not many seem to believe the Paris peace talks with decide many substantive matters affecting the ending the war in the South Vietnam until after the American Presidential nominating conventions, if not the American election.

"I can't see why t Hanoi should negotiate very much with the a lame-duck Johnson Administration," one Western diplomat explained, "until after it is clear that (Senator Robert F.) Kennedy is not going to be nominated. If (Hubert H.) Humphrey gets the Democratic nomination, Hanoi might seriously start negotiating then. But, if Kennedy gets the nomination, they'll stall. Johnson has to promise Hanoi just as much as Krie Kennedy to get peace—and probably more. Is suspect Hanoi would rather wait for a new administration If Johnson and Knie Kennedy both offer Hanoi the same thing, I suspect North Vietnam would prefer to wait and accept the peace terms from Kennedy."

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cabinet 8 (normass/deepe)

A captured Communist document explains: "good "According to our policy, we must fight the wer and negotiate at the same time. What then is the purpose of fighting and negotiating?

Another reason is to expose the enemy's political attack upon us and to show that ours is the just cause and he his the unjust. This means that the war will be settled only on the battlefield, not in the conference room."
