Hue tonight graphically illustrates—in miniature—the political

jeopardy of the United States presence in Vietnam.

The provincial office of the U.S. Agency for International Development (A. I.D.) was closed, as American economic advisors were withdrawn, leaving knikad the supply warehouses unattended.

Two officers with the Joint United States Public Information Offices-an offshoot of United States Information Service, which a which assists with psychological warfare operations-were evacuated evacuated on the advise of the acting American consul.

The gravest danger of all is we that the Communists are seizing control—and indirectly leading—the anti-Ky, anti-American agitation.

vietnamese sources call have termed this subtle subversion as the "invisible hands of the Communists" pulling the strings on the situation, although the most reliable sources here believe Prime Minister Ky "went too far, too fast" by labelling the whole movement of agitation as Communist.

The present crisis is for more grave than previous ones on two significant counted.

- 1. This is the first political crisis since the committment of American combat ground units aye year ago. The government of Prime Minister Ky took power peacefully in aye palace conference last June.
- 2. This is the first time the Buddhist leadership attempted to topple aye military government. In the crisis against the late Ngo Dinh Diem in nineteen sixty three, the Buddhist agitation was futile.—until the Vietnamse army launched the final blow. Again, aye year later, the Buddhists agitated—much like during the present crisis—against Prime Minister Tran Van Huong—but still it was the Vietnamese military command that had to bring the civilian government down.

Vietnamese armed forces is the government—and the Buddhist leader leadership is attempting to topple the military regime by shattering to both the military discipline and the political authority of the armed forces.

Political VACQUE general of the Vietnamese First Infantry Division, responsible for securing Rue, has sided with the anti-government in Buddhist leadership and announced he would fight both the Communists and the Saigon regime. Since, the security of Americans could notrptnot be guaranteed, the "non-essential" personnel were at evacuated by heart helicopter and aircraft tonight.

Far more serious, the First Corps Commander, Maj. Gen.

Nguyen Van Chuan, who is responsible for the five northern proving provinces, is also siding with the Buddhist leadership, but more subtly. If he openly sides with the Buddhists in the future, is sitempts of the thousand American Marines to pacify the provinces the Chirty rive thousand American Marines to pacify the provinces rural population while having mammoth anti-government demonstration demonstrations in their rear base would seriously curtail the anti-Communist war effort—if notrptnot make it politically impossible.

But, the worst blow came today, when sources close to
the Prime Minister's Office revealed that Ky's Deputy Prime
Minister—and Minister for War—General Nguyen Huu Co, had also
indirectly sided with the Buddhist—led Committees dissident
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reported that General Co countermanded the orders of Prime Minister
Minister Ky by attempting to order the two battalions of
Vietnamese Marines the Danang airbase—where they are
in turn protecting American Marines—and freturn to Saigon. Ky
hurriedly dispatched Lt. Gen. Cao Van Vien, chief of staff of
the Vietnamese High Command, to re-order the Vietnamese Marines
to remain in position around the Danang airbase.

As Buddhist-inspired demonstrations consin continued in Hue, Danang and Saigon, as his military officers would norphub as the military disicipline and political unity of the Vietnamese armed forces fragmenting. Prime Minister Ky hurriedly called together aye "roundtable" discussion with some of the ranking religious and political groupings to work out aye political formulated and political groupings power into the hands of the civilians.

But, press prospects of that looked doomed-for the seven the moderate Buddhist leaders who are for fomenting Ky's problems boycotted the session.
