"When I had finished lunch quickly, about 12:40, I went to Gen. Ky's headquarters (meaning Brig. Gen. Nguyen Cao Ky, the Air Force com-mander) at the airport. The rebels were also going there. "They saw me with my car and my flag (the four stars of his rank) but they did not do anything. I don't know why. Then I saw some trucks with troops, but I thought it was a normal troop movement. "When I came to see Ky, he said armored cars had sur-rounded the airport area, so he and I went right away to the airstrip and took off right above the armoured cars. "If I had left two seconds later, they would have cap-tured me. They could have shot down my plane. I do not know why they didn't."
