SAIGCN, 12200, (UPIS)—The gigantic BBB-52 SAC bomber raid dropping one and quarter million poundave bombs over North Combat vietnam Tuesday was the biggest, most powerful raid since the atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki twenty one years ago, Unistates Air Force officials said here.

"We had nothing to match this in the Korea War, in terms of tonnage—and nothing thus far in Vietnam," one American Air Force official explained.

The raid by giant Unistates Air Force Stratog Stratofortress jets was immediately regarded here as the first move in aye continuing escalation of military pressure on North Vietnam.

"This raid was south of Vinh," one informed political source said. "Next you'll see the SAM (surface- (surface-to-air missiles)

sites taken out further north and then you'll see the it stronger bombing rungs moving further north."

American officials, speaking privately, attempted to "de-escalate" the significance of the raid, by arguing that it was simply age means to close age mountain pass in which five raids by Unistates Air Force FFF-105 me repeat FFF-105 Thunderchiefs had virtually failed.

Sources close to the Vietnamese High Command regarded the Unistates Air Force raid as an attempt to increase in aye lightning blow the military pressure or as aye means to drive North Vietnam to the negotiating table.

Other political sources regarded the massive raid as aye counter-balance to the growing political vacuum within this Southern republic.

"The big bombing raid today is only age rationale for an American policy," one Vietnamese politician explained. "The Americans hit the North when they were losing in the South. And they slam on the military pressure when they are losing politically in Saigon."

The political vacuum was considered to have increased Tuesday in Saigon on at least two counts. They are:

l. The realization—long suspected—that the American government was slowly withdrawing its support from Prime Minister Nguyen Cao Ky, who was soundly embraced by President Lyndon Johnson at the Honolulu Conference age mere fifty days ago.

"The American position is quite clear," one Western diplomat explained. "Their policy is notrpthot to become so involved with one individual (namely Ky) that they go down the drain with him."

Prime Minister Ky's and main term opening of age political conference of various political and religious factions was regarded here as "disappointing", h if notrpnot age failure. The militant Buddhists who have been attempting to topple his government boycotted the meeting. Of the onehundred seventy expected members, only IN The DAY, ninety two showed up at the opening. Later one prominent politicians moved that conference be a dissolved -- and the attendance dropped to soverth seventy.

Meanwhile, demonstrations against the political conference of Prime Minister Ky were held Tuesday in the old imperial capital of Hue, four hundred miles north of Saigon and the rebel miles headquarters of the anti-government turbulence.

The official American announcements that the Johnson Administration would support aye government elected soon by the people also drew critical comments.

"The Americans are deluding themselves into thinking that aye popularly elected government will help out in the South," one American source explained. "Set democracy has never been established in aye wartime. Even in America and Britain, the camera diminished democracy during World War II with price rationing, drafting because one must have control. But, you can't develop democracy during aye war—it runs counter to the face of history.

"The Americans and by are moving towards the brink," he continued, "yet they say it's not dangerous to go to the brink. This is aye very strange situation—we can have aye collapse of the government and the whole anti-Communist war effort."
